



Obtain career advice from career development professionals, rather than from friends



For this last one you will attract people's opinion especially if you are a newcomer to Canada. "Listen to all that information without asking the right questions and you'll end up confused," says Darlene Baker, career coach at Directions for Immigrants. "Sharing the same cultural and professional backgrounds does not necessarily mean that what didn't work for your friends is not going to work for you," says Darlene. Instead, she suggests you seek help from <u>career development professionals</u>. "They advise, coach, provide information and support people who are planning, seeking and managing their life and work direction," according to the Alberta

Learning and Information Service (ALIS) website.

When you meet with a career coach, ask them these questions and listen to their advice:

- How do I develop effective job search strategies?
- What are the steps to pursue accreditation in Canada?
- What do successful immigrant professionals do to find work?
- How can I explain my international experience to an employer?
- What resources are available to me?
- What are my next steps?

You will likely make a well-informed decision on your career planning in Canada, based on the up-to-date and accurate information you obtained from a career coach. In Alberta, you must be licensed by the Alberta Insurance Council (AIC) to sell insurance. In most situations, internationally educated insurance brokers will be required to complete all of the steps that are required for a Canadian applicant. Changes in the accreditation process for internationally educated engineers

Since May 2018, The Association of Professional Engineers and Geoscientists of Alberta (APEGA) requires a competency-based assessment (CBA) as part of the application process for a Professional Engineer (<u>P.Eng</u>) or Licensee designation. Candidates have to demonstrate 22 key competencies in six categories. For more details, read the information on the <u>APEGA</u> website. 
Career Coaching Tip
