



Go Beyond the Small Talk

Joan's tips on how to start good conversations

How do you like this weather? What do you do for a living? These are typical small talk questions people ask at professional networking events, but do they really help you get to know the person? Not really, says Joan Matsusaki, career coach at Directions for Immigrants.

In our most recent Networking Session, Joan challenged our internationally educated professionals to go beyond the small talk and truly connect with people.

"You have to be willing to ask questions at a deeper level and be able to take the risk when meeting someone new. If you show real interest, they will most likely respond positively," says Joan. For example, following the question "Where are you from?" you could ask "What was it like to grow up in that town?" or "If I were to visit, what places would you recommend?" The answers will tell you so much more about that person than just a spot on the map.

Joan suggested to think about questions that cover safe topics such as the ones mentioned in the video "How to engage in better small talk" by radio host Malcolm Azania.

If you truly engage in someone's story they will reciprocate rather than thinking that you are just trying to get a contact in the industry. "In today's economy with many people out of work it is better to ask the questions "What is your profession? And why did you choose that career?" rather than "What do you do for a living," suggests Joan.

We help internationally educated professionals <u>in any occupation in any industry</u>. For this edition of the newsletter we are highlighting the occupation of <u>Social Worker</u>. Social workers help individuals, families, groups, and communities to enhance their individual and collective well-being. They help them develop the skills and use their own resources to resolve problems. In Alberta, social workers must be registered with the <u>Alberta College of Social Workers (ACSW)</u> to practice this profession. Internationally educated social workers need to apply for an assessment from the <u>Canadian Association of Social Workers (CASW)</u> to have their credentials evaluated. According to the CASW 2016 Annual Report, "CASW completed 102 individual assessments of applicants from 33 different countries seeking equivalency of their internationally obtained social work education to Canadian standards."
